### THE REGULAR PROGRAM

A rabic for Speakers of Other Languages Program (ASOL) has been designed to deliver Arabic language instruction to non-native speakers from all over the world. The UJLC offers nine levels of Arabic (beginners, intermediate and advanced) throughout the year. The Fall and Spring semesters last for (16) weeks including registration and final examinations period. The Summer semester lasts for (8) weeks including registration and final examinations period. Classes in the Regular Program run from Sunday to Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 12:40 p.m.

# The Quarter System

needs of students, UJLC offers Arabic classes following the quarter system. Unlike the regular semesters, which are typically 16 weeks in length, the quarter semester consists of 10 weeks of instruction including orientation and final examinations and will be offered in Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer. Students will study 20 hours per week with a total of 200 hours per a quarter.

n the quarter model, the textbook used is Al-Kitaab fii Taallum al- Arabiyya.

## **Textbooks**

The Language Center is a pioneer in the country and the region in authoring its own textbooks. # **ASOL Levels Description**

## Level One

This level is designed for students with no prior knowledge of Modern Standard Arabic. It will introduce students to the fundamentals of Modern Standard Arabic (MSA) and to the culture of the Arab World. Students learn the 28 basic letters of the Arabic alphabet.

Students will also learn the sound system, the writing system, elementary grammar, vocabulary items, and language constructions. The course also involves regular use of audio-visual materials in Arabic. By the end of the course students will be able to read and write using Arabic scripts. They will also learn the correct pronunciation and be able to distinguish different Arabic sounds and verbally communicate on a basic level. Pronunciation is carefully taught and correct as a tool to build confidence and better speaking skills.

They will be able to write words and short sentences as part of dictation and from memory. Students will also learn to connect speaking with writing. Combining the two will ensure better speaking and writing skills at this early stage. students at this level will be able to write short and simple paragraphs about themselves, family, friends, and the weather among other topics.

Students will be able to give their identity, say greetings, ask and answer basic questions and use the vocabularies they learn in real-life conversations.

Topics covered in level one fully integrate the four skills and include: Countries, Continents, Jordanian citiies,

Directions, Seasons, Months, Days of the Week, Topography (river, mountain, valley...), Geometric shapes (pyramid, circle...), Colors, Animals and birds, Plants (vegetable and fruits), Clothes, The Human Body, Family, Transportation, Parts of a House, Kitchenware, Drinks, Furniture, Office equipment, Numbers, Calculation (+, -,=), Parts of a City, City facilities, Jobs/ employment, Verbs (past, present, imperative), Pronouns, Grammatical gender, Singular and plural (masculine plural, feminine plural, broken plural), Demonstrative pronouns, Possessive pronouns, Nationalities, Adverbs (after, before, under...), Adjectives, Using the dictionary, Sentence structure and usage.





## **Level Two**

This level is a continuation of elementary Arabic (level one). In this class students will continue to work on both Standard Arabic and Spoken Arabic (Levantine). The overall goal of this course is for students to speak, read and write Arabic and improve their listening skill. This class will continue to introduce students to the basic structures of both types of Arabic, to expand their vocabulary in key areas and use the vocabulary they study to form sentences and describe what is happening around them. Specific functions to achieve include the ability to write and construct correct Arabic sentences, talk at ease about themselves, food, hobbies, studies, likes and dislikes. students initiate conversations and understand what others say when they speak at a normal pace using words and constructions they have learned. They will also learn a number of social expressions that will allow them to interact in indigenous Arabic situations. Culture will be an integral part of this level and students will learn about Arab culture and habits as they advance in the course.

Topics covered in level two fully integrate the four skills and include: extended greetings and civilities, finding an apartment, extending residency, touring downtown, at the restaurant, at the clinic, at the mall, at the bank, at the library, a trip to a Jordanian city, a visit to a friend, broken plurals, demonstrative pronouns, interrogative pronouns, negation, relative pronouns and prepositions.



## **Level Three**

In this level students will be able to read Arabic texts, understand them and express their general ideas. They will also construct cohesively correct sentences describing items or talking about different subjects and actively employ vocabularies in daily life. Speaking and reading are stressed more in this level and a combination of standard Arabic and spoken Arabic will boost students' self-confidence in their use of the language. Culture topics molded in daily life situations continue to be an integral part of this level. Students are introduced to simple short stories and articles introducing new literary genres that serve the language skills taught at this level.

Such topics include: leisure time, sports, reading a newspaper, visiting places, writing about favorite topics, listening to popular TV shows, introducing media items in addition to group speaking sessions.





# **Level Four**

Students in level four will be able to handle a variety of communicative tasks. They should participate in most informal and formal conversations on topics related to media, newspapers, school, home, and leisure activities. They may also speak about some topics such as: employment, current events, resources in the Arab world, democracy in Jordan, Arab authors, education in Jordan, in addition to matters of public and community interests.

Listening in class and in the language lab is stressed in this level. Using the acquired vocabularies and structures they have learned, students will be able to summarize and rephrase listening tasks. They will also develop their silent reading skills and pinpoint main ideas in texts written or recorded.

Students will be able to read and analyze newspaper articles through developing their media and journalism vocabulary and constructions. As a result, and with ease, students should be able to use smoothly ideas and concepts taught in class. Language components introduced include verbal and nominal sentences, demonstrative pronouns and the use of verb conjugations properly in their speaking and written assignments.

## **Level Five**

Students in this level will be able to handle with confidence a large number of communicative tasks. They will participate actively in most informal and formal exchanges on a variety of real topics. Skills in this level tend to be combined and interwoven in order to relate relevant and supporting facts in connected, paragraphlength discourses.

They will also understand communicative and descriptive texts. These texts reflect and use the linguistic competencies students have achieved and present the learner with the necessary tools to identify the rich and diverse Arabic culture in which Arabic language is used. This level also builds and enhances students' language intuition. Students can predict the meaning of new words in context and perform linguistic tasks with substantial proficiency.

Students in this level will use the four language skills in a consistent and coordinated way to use language with more confidence and produce well-organized texts and thoughts.

Topics in this level include but are not limited to Arabic society, media, current events, debates, expressive writing, translation and journalism.



#### **Level Six**

Students in level six will perform all advanced-level tasks with linguistic confidence, and competence. They will be able to explain in detail and narrate fully and accurately in all time frames. In addition, they should be competent to produce a structured argument to support their opinions.

This level will boost students' rhetoric and comprehension through introducing different literary texts. They will analyze news items and discuss current events. This level also introduces students to famous Arab writers.

They will write summaries of literary and news items. They will also write extensively about topics relating to particular interests and special areas of competence.

All four language skills are integrated into this course to enable students to use language freely and with confidence. Speaking and writing are of great importance in this level.

## Level Seven

In level seven, students should understand the main ideas of complex texts on both concrete and abstract topics. They can understand a wide range of demanding, longer texts, and recognize implicit meanings. Analytical thinking is stressed at this level as students use the language skills they have developed to engage in discussions about different topics.

They will also develop and use their writing skills in different genres. They will be asked to present reports, articles and essays on a wide variety of topics. Students will also develop their media skills tools and learn how to critically talk about and respond to a wide range of media reports.

Functional syntax will be used and will serve the aforementioned skills and goals.

Compiled authentic teaching materials will be used in this level.

# Level Eight

In this advanced level, students are expected to interact fluently with native speakers. They can also produce clear, detailed texts on a wide range of subjects and explain a viewpoint on a topical issue. They can give extended warnings, suggestions, recommendations or advice. For example, they can give a detailed suggestion on how to solve a problem. Students will be able to write about on variety of topics with accuracy.

Students are also expected to understand conventional narrative and descriptive texts such as expanded descriptions of persons, places, and things, and narrations about past, present, and future events. Students will understand the main points and supporting details in any given text.

Field visits, debates and guest speakers will supplement the aforementioned skills and goals.

Compiled authentic teaching materials will be used in this level.





## **Level Nine**

In level nine, students will express ideas fluently and spontaneously and can use language effectively for social, academic and professional purposes and topics of community, national, or international interests making use of the Standard/Spoken Arabic combination. They will also produce clear, well-structured, detailed texts on complex subjects, showing controlled use of organizational patterns, connectors and cohesive devices. They will be able to explain in detail and narrate fully and accurately in all time frames. In addition, they will be able to handle the tasks pertaining to the advanced level across a variety of topics. They can provide a structured argument to support their opinions, and they may construct hypotheses as well.

Students at this stage should be able to understand virtually everything heard or read. They can summarize information from different spoken and written sources, reconstruct arguments and accounts in a coherent presentation and express fluently and precisely and differentiate finer shades of meaning even in the most complex situations.

Students should write about a variety of topics with significant accuracy and detail. They can handle informal and formal situations and write extensively about topics relating to particular interests and special areas of interest.

Compiled authentic teaching materials will be used in this level.

Students in all levels will attend two hours of listening classes weekly in the language lab. Students will also take four hours of spoken Arabic weekly.

Some levels are offered only when there is enough number of students registered for that level.

### **ASOL DIPLOMA**

UJLC also offers "Teaching Arabic for Speakers of Other Languages" diploma program to UJ students and international individuals and groups.

The program aims at preparing students to be certified teachers trained in the use and practice of the theories and materials of the ASOL program.

The diploma is a one-year program which consists of 8 courses (24 credit hours) in addition to the on-the-job training component.

## METHODS OF TEACHING ASOL

UJLC offers two teacher training programs: One is a long-term program of 120 training hours, and the other is a short-term program consisting of 40 training hours. Both courses will be offered upon request.

The two programs aim at providing the necessary skills and methods to prepare trainees to become qualified Arabic instructors. The two programs focus on the application part of Training, making use of the expertise they learn at UJLC.
